

NB Chess Club resumes play

NEW BRITAIN — Chess play resumes after the holidays at the New Britain Chess Club (NBCC) with an open speed tournament (five-minute games) tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. at the Quartette Club, sponsor of the NBCC, 225 Wooster St.

The single round-robin tournament is limited to the first 25 players with assignments on a first sign-up, first-play basis. It is expected that many of Connecticut's top players will participate. The event will be directed by Arkadijs Strazdins, NBCC president.

CHAMPIONSHIP FINALS

The first round of the 1987 37th annual New Britain city chess championship finals, a single round-robin U.S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated tournament, will begin Jan. 13, and continue for 10 successive Tuesdays at the Quartette Club.

The 12 players who qualified of the 40, who competed in the qualification tournament last year, are:

Two past champions are playing in the event: May who won once, and Strazdins, 30 times, the first 24 consecutively.

RESERVE TOURNEY

The 1987 16th annual New Britain city chess championship reserve tournament, a six-round Swiss system USCF rated event, will start Jan. 27 at 7:30 p.m. at the Quartette Club.

It is open to all, but participants must be or become members of the USCF. Trophies will be awarded to the top three and top junior player under 18. Also, if in each Class — A, B, C, D and E — there are four players or more, the top player in that class will be awarded a trophy.

More information and registration may be secured from May, USCF accredited tournament director, tomorrow, Jan. 13 and 20 from 7 to 7:30 p.m. at the Quartette Club.

Both tournaments are sponsored by the Quartette Club and the NBCC an affiliate of the USCF. All official USCF rated tournament games at the NBCC start at 7:30 p.m., and the time limit is 40 moves in 90 minutes. The second time limit is (if needed) 30 minutes sudden death.

If the event had been scored by team rather than individual scores, England would be first with one lost and one drawn match, United States, second with one lost and two drawn matches, and the Soviets third with two lost and two drawn matches.

The Soviets besides the United States lost to England, 2½-1½.

WOMEN'S TEAM

In the women's team competition, the United States team scored 22 points out of 42 possible, to tie for 13th place.

The Soviets won the gold with 33½-8½; Hungary, the silver with 29-13, and Romania took the bronze medal on tie-break over Red China with 28-14.

CHESS OLYMPIAD

In the 27th world team men's and the 12th women's chess olympiads, recently played in the Republic of Djibouti, the United States men's team in the 14-round Swiss system event did well, taking the bronze medal with a score of 38½-17½, out of 56 possible points.

The Soviets took the gold medal with 40-16; England, the silver with 39-17.

There were more than 100 countries, and most of the world's best chess players, the largest ever participated.

Retired 43-year Herald employee, was business and finance editor

NEW BRITAIN — Anthony G. Grey, 78, of 27 Old Farm Dr., Newington, who retired in 1972 as business and finance editor of The Herald, died Saturday at home after a short illness. He was the widower of Helen (Baclaski) Grey.



ANTHONY GREY Born in New Britain, he was a 1929 graduate of New Britain High School and later took extension courses at Trinity College in Hartford. He began with The Herald as a correspondent while still in high school. He later covered the activities of the School, Fire and Water Boards and hospital and medical news, eventually specializing in business, financial, labor and industrial news.

In 1957, he began writing The Herald's business column, "The World of

Business," and was cited in 1960 by the International Assn. of Machinists for his reporting of labor news. He retired after 43 years with The Herald.

He was a former member of the New Britain Chess Club, winning its championship in 1939 and participating in several Connecticut Chess League tournaments. He was also a charter member of the New Britain Press Club, having served as secretary and treasurer.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Carolyn Dignazio of Newington; three brothers, Edward Grey and Bill and Albert Gryboski, all of New Britain, a granddaughter and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 7:45 a.m. at New Britain Memorial Funeral Home, 444 Farmington Ave., and at 8:30 at Sacred Heart Church. Burial will be in Sacred Heart Cemetery.

NEW BRITAIN — Twelve qualified expert players for the preliminary tournament competed for the 1987 37th annual New Britain city chess championship finals, an 11-round, round-robin U.S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated event at the Quartette Club.

Competitions were held each Tuesday night for the past three months.

The play for the championship was decided in the last round, when chess master Steve Hobart needed a victory over chess master Eric J. Godin, who was leading with a half point margin. However, Hobart lost the game and Godin with a score of $9\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ took the championship for the first time.

He drew with Christopher Dearing in the fourth round and lost to Brian Bambrugh in the ninth round. Hobart took second place honors with 8-3. He lost to Dearing in the second round and forfeited to Robert Milardo in the sixth round. Dearing was third at 7-4.

Three players tied for fourth place at 6-5, and using a tie-break formula, the finishers in order, were: 4th — Bambrugh; 5th — Craig F. Palmer; 6th — Michael Casella.

Others with a score of 5-6, or lower, were: 7th — Scott M. Gunderman; 8th — Paul Wooster; 9th — Milardo; 10th — Ronald J. Bourassa; 11th — Duncan W. May; 12th — Karl H. Kochman.

Eighty-six players competed in the championship cycle, preliminary, reserve and finals.

Trophies will be awarded to the top six Tuesday night at the Quartette Club.

Arkadijs Strazdins, who has won

the New Britain city chess championship 30 times since 1952, was not able to play this year.

The tournament was co-sponsored by the Quartette Club, and the New Britain Chess Club, and was directed by May and Godin.

Farmington resident captures NB Chess Club championship

NEW BRITAIN — National Senior Chess Master Richard N. Bauer of Farmington, ranked second in Connecticut and first at the 88-member New Britain Chess Club, is the 1987 New Britain Chess Club (NBCC) champion.

Winning his first NBCC championship, he scored $5\frac{1}{2}$, in the recent six-round Swiss system U.S. Chess Federation (USCF) rated event at the Quartette Club with a record 44 members participating in the 37th annual event.

Bauer won his first five games and in the last round drew with Eric J. Godin, defending champion. Bauer won the Connecticut open championship in 1983 and 1984, and has won other tournaments in New England.

Three players tied for second place at 5-1. Using a tie-break formula, the finishers were in order:

2nd — Zoran Lazatich, 1985 champion of New Britain.

3rd — Godin, defending champion of West Hartford.

Also awarded the magazine for one year was Casella, 17, a senior at Aquinas High School, New Britain, the top junior player in Connecticut. As a result of his play in some tournaments this year, he has reached national expert rating for the first time with 2,044 points (expert classification is 2,000-2,199 points), putting him in 44th place in the "top 50" junior players in the United States (17-18 years old).

Bauer has won the Connecticut Open Championship in 1983-84 and he is 1987 NBCC champion.

The exhibition will be held Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. at the Quartette Club, 225 Wooster St. Bauer will play against up to 35 players. Since there is a limited number of boards, assignments will be on a first sign-up, first-play basis. Entry fee is \$4 for senior players and \$3 for students and senior citizens (NBCC members \$1 less.)

Players who are not NBCC members should bring their own chess sets and boards, if available. Chess players who would like to compete against Bauer should contact Arkadijs Strazdins, club president, from 7 to 7:25 that night. Early registrations are welcome. Spectators are welcome free of charge.

The NBCC is sponsored by the New Britain Quartette Club and meets every Tuesday from 7 p.m. to 12:50 a.m., at the Quartette Club. The NBCC, with 88 members, is the biggest and strongest chess club in Connecticut. The only bigger membership clubs in New England are Boston, Billerica and Framingham, Mass., Orono, Maine, and Burlington, Vt.

Bauer is rated over 2400, or senior chessmaker strength. According to Strazdins, Bauer should have been able to defeat a greater percentage of the field. He also should have been able to complete all games within three hours or less.

ACTIVE CHESS

Chess tournaments consistent with the new "active chess" format will begin at the New Britain Chess Club this Tuesday.

Players will be grouped into sections of four players each to play three rounds at the time control of a game each 30 minutes. The entire "quadrangular" will occur from 8 and 11 p.m.

Ludek Pachma, a Czech grandmaster, writes about combination and strategy in his book, "Modern Chess Strategy." He elaborates on the various kinds of strategy that can be employed, and shows how each leads to tactical opportunities.

The section on the rook alone makes this book invaluable to the serious chess student, since the rook is so important in both middle and end games.

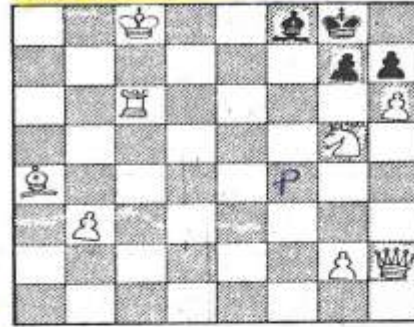

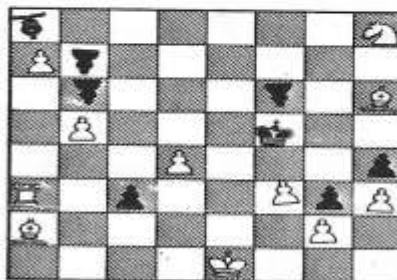
