THE HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

JANUARY

It is a new year and a new dawn and chapter for the NBCC family. But before I dive into the happenings at the club, I, as club historian, am taking this grand blessed opportunity to report to our entire family and the Connecticut chess community that on January 13, our esteemed president, USCF NM Suhas Kodali, and his wife, Anitha, welcomed the birth of their first child – a beautiful baby girl named Anya. What a joyous and special way to usher in 2026 for them and the club!

Back at the club, we started 2026 with a very significant highlight – master classes on the second, third, and fourth Saturdays by IM Jan van de Mortel. The IM delivered very engaging two-hour classes each evening, with the focus on reviewing games from the world-renowned Tata Steel Chess Championship in the Netherlands, followed by analysis of games from the 2026 club championship in progress. Jan is one of the top ranked chess players in Connecticut, and it was so wonderful to hear him share his chess experiences throughout his illustrious career. Even though the classes were geared toward class A and higher rated players, there were some lower-rated players who joined the group to listen and learn from one of the state's elite chess players. Thanks, Jan! And thanks to Suhas for organizing these classes.

On January 26, the club celebrated a very special day in its long-established history. It was 125 years ago (exactly half of the years of our nation's existence) that our vibrant organization was founded by Judge John Kirkham. That is incredible! You might recall that Bob Cyr found our club's founding date in the *Hartford Courant* when he was researching our club's earliest days. Way to go, Bob! Although there were no formal festivities planned for our club's milestone anniversary date, Bob did report this amazing and historic news to the membership. Here's to the next 125 years for the NBCC!

FEBRUARY

Every Presidents Day in the quaint, cozy town of Parsippany in north-central New Jersey, chess enthusiasts gather at the Hilton hotel to compete in the holy grail of chess – the largest team chess tournament in history – the World Amateur Team Chess Championship. With a record over 330 teams this year, this tournament was directed by Mr. E. Steven Doyle, who is one of the most iconic and legendary chess organizers in America. This huge tournament attracts players from as young as age five to as old as age ninety and attracts players from all skills from beginner to grandmaster. For the past twenty years, with the exception of the year this event was held online due to covid, NBCC teams have represented at this grand event. This year, the club fielded two all-four player teams and one three-quarter player scholastic team. Without further ado, here were some of the highlights.

On the first adult team, NBCC Legends, we had veteran USATE players FM Richard Bauer, USCF NM James Nitz, Doug Fiske, and John Nitz. Unfortunately, FM Nelson Castaneda was supposed to be on this team but had to withdraw due of illness. Despite two very hard losses on day one, this team fought back with a vengeance to win their next four matches. Of historic note, James swept all of his opponents, going 6-0, and became only the fifth member from our family to earn a perfect score at USATE. Way to go, Kramnitz! On the second adult team, Pickled Pawn Pushers, we had Ian Wohlhieter, Bob Cyr, Dan Knowles, and David Fusco. This team also struggled in the early rounds but came back to earn 2.5 match points. The top boards were challenging as expected. Bob and Ian played their best, as did Dan and David. Unfortunately, Bob was scoreless in this event (he would never mention that of anyone else except himself) and was disappointed with his results, but he was a still a great team player and friend to his fellow teammates. Dan, who is on a hot streak lately and played in his first USATE, dominated in his games and clinched five wins. Lastly, this team tried out for the Best Costume/Gimmick prize on Sunday night (day 2) with their funny pickle costumes but did not receive enough claps from the audience. Even though this team did not win the contest, they were interviewed by a local chess personality, Chess Master Ken, who published the video on YouTube. Finally, the nearly all-NBCC scholastic team, Checkmated Kings, Hikura Flin, we had all USATE newbies Jack Qian, Luca Festa, Calliste Herve-Mignucci, and Liam Cheng. The all-star kids team performed very well and ended up with 3.5 match points. The kids are certainly doing well these days, and one of the days, they will all become experts or masters. Speaking of the youths, David Mashkov and Brian Dai from the club also competed on separate teams and did quite well, winning 3.5 and 4.5 of their games, respectively. Outstanding job, young men!

But the winner of the Top Connecticut Team prize this year was not earned by a NBCC-affiliated team. It was won by the team Best by Test, with member Joe Bihlmeyer as a solid board four player. Rounding the other three boards were Jamison Kao (who is Hong Kong's number one chess player!) and experts Michael Uwakwe and Matt Chan. Best by Test took home the coveted prize of best in state with 4.5 match points and will receive a beautiful plaque. Also of note, Richard Hardin of the club took home the biggest upset of round one (650 rating points).

Beyond the competition, it was nice to engage in social activity with teammates between rounds at restaurants. Bob's team enjoyed reliving great USATE and NBCC stories with drinks at Ruth's Christ Steakhouse. On Sunday evening, David Fusco and Bob joined John and James Nitz and James' wife for a delicious meal at Seasons 52 in Parsippany. Good times and great family. This is what USATE is all about.

My friends, I want to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Doyle again for his labor of love and devotion to USATE. Not only is he an excellent organizer and director, but he has also devoted a lifetime of service to chess to this great country of ours. He is a great chess advocate, leader, promoter, and dear friend. Incidentally, Mr. Doyle was a member of the NBCC way back in the day when he used to work in the Greater Hartford area. Thanks, Mr. Doyle, for making the NBCC family feel right at home at USATE.

Finally, if you have never had experienced USATE, you must put it on your bucket list. Until next year, everyone, I will see you all at USATE – same time, same place, same station, same club historian. Have a wonderful, blessed year.

Historically, the Tuesday after the World Amateur Team event, the club has held a one-week break from the club championship, which I will report on later. This year, the club continued its series of rated blitz tournaments on the day after USATE. The turnout, as expected, was lower than normal. Many of the players in the team tournament were just too exhausted to play a fourth day of chess in a row! But that did not stop David Mashkov, who not only played in USATE but gave a lecture on the night of the blitz tournament and ended up winning it with a perfect score. Talk about endurance! David is becoming a real tough competitor at blitz, now having won or tied for first place seven times in the last twelve NBCC blitz events. He is unstoppable!

IM Jan van de Mortel concluded his master class series at the club on February 21. The master started the evening by paying a tribute to the late GM Jan Timman, one of Jan's former colleagues and friends, who passed away recently. GM Timman was one of the strongest Dutch chess players since former World Chess Champion Max Euwe. Jan reviewed some of Mr. Timman's games, including Jan's draw with him in a Dutch league match. Later that evening, Jan switched gears and analyzed some of the games from USATE played by Bob Cyr and FM Richard Bauer. Particularly, Jan noticed a pattern in why Bob lost all of his games! Bob is keeping that a secret! Sorry, folks. Jan made note of a nice endgame in one of Rick's games and complimented him on his play. Jan concluded the master class with his best professional career game – a win against the late GM Gildardo Garcia in the Tata Steel Chess Championship decades ago. Thanks again to the IM for his gracious time and energy for his amazing classes. We hope for more of these in the future at the club, and we hope that Jan will return to the chess scene very soon and become a GM!

Our club's first classical tournament of 2026 took place over eight weeks (seven Tuesdays and a week break for USATE). The event was directed by the club's most senior TD based on age, Mark Bourque, who had huge assistance from TD Coordinator Roger Bessette and seasoned TD Bob Cyr. This was a two-sectioned heritage event, with a championship section for players rated 1600 or higher (but players rated between 1400 and 1599 had the option of playing up) and a candidates or reserve section for players rated under 1600. Throughout the event, there were many intense but lively battles. And some, like the round six match between FM Nelson Castaneda and Miles Griffin, had to be postponed and played a week after the scheduled round. Thanks to Nelson for agreeing to play his make-up game with Miles. Incidentally, Nelson drove all the way to New Jersey to meet Miles for this crucial game, a historical first! This pivotal game would determine who would advance in the leaderboard. Nelson drew his match with Miles and won his final match, thus securing a solid first place for him in the championship, marking his thirteenth championship title. Blazing the candidates section was Dan Knowles, marking the second time that he has won this section. Overall, it was a very nice but, as expected, long duration event, which attracted a record fifty-nine members.

MARCH

The club was slated to commence its first meeting in March, the unofficial start to spring, on the third, but it had to cancel its activities due to hazardous road conditions caused by freezing rain. Therefore, the first official meeting of March was held on the tenth, with a simultaneous chess exhibition by club champion FM Nelson Castaneda. Prior to the simul, the professor presented a very fine lecture of selected games from the final round of the club championship. The simul drew a respectable turnout, with twenty-six players, ranging in age from eight to eighty-six and ranging in rank from novice to expert, taking on the master. The competitors really put the full court pressure on Nelson, slowing him down and making him think long and hard! The simul started at 7:25 p.m. and ended at ten minutes before midnight, with the penultimate game of the night between Nelson and Dennis Himes (the only winner who prevailed against Nelson). There were, however, twelve draws earned (maybe a club record) against Nelson. Those who drew Nelson were Mark Bourque, Oishik De, Mark Krechet, David Mashkov, Krystian Tkaczewski Sr., Yonatan Axelrad, Arya Shah, Praharsh Varada, Drew Hetherington, Brian Dai, Calliste Herve-Mignucci, and Krystian Tkaczewski Jr. We thank the master for hosting this simul and thank the participants for competing in this annual event.

The club continued its fun, casual month of March with a team tournament. Ten four-player teams were formed. Pairings were determined on team performance, like at USATE. It was a delight to see some familiar faces who we have not seen in quite a while, like prior club presidents Norman Burtness and USCF NM Derek Meredith, join into this incredible, unique event. Due to time constraints, there were only three rounds for the team event. Taking hold the gold was the team comprised of David Mashkov, Dennis Himes, Arya Shah, and Panagiotis Poursaitidis, which earned three match points.

Lastly, before the club's next major tournament, we held another rated blitz chess event. That evening, Praharsh Varada was scheduled to give the lecture, but he had to cancel due to illness. Suhas then had Bob ask Joe Bihlmeyer, our club's head coach, to lecture in Praharsh's place, but he also was ill! So then, Suhas asked David Mashkov, and he enthusiastically agreed. And after his lecture, David dominated the blitz event, claiming first place in a field of thirty-three players. David is an amazing, talented young man on and off the chess board, and he is an asset and a great friend to the club. Way to go, champion!

APRIL

The second classical tournament hosted by the club in 2026 was the Winner's Keepers event. This year, the tournament was named the Castaneda-Axelrad-Pandey Chess Tournament since these members each won their respective sections of this event in 2025. Sixty-two players showed up for this year's exciting tournament, which set a new club record. This was a four-week tournament in a Swiss format. The club continues to see many youths competing in our events, and this tournament was no exception. Winning the Castaneda section, and now marking a milestone for his fortieth win or tie in classical tournaments in the club, was FM Richard Bauer. It should be noted that Rick won on tie-breaks in a four-way tie for first place because he was the only player to not take a half-point bye among the other three winners who earned three points each. Consequently, half-point byes do not count toward tie-break points. Claiming first place in the Axelrad section was Arya Shah, who earned his first win in a major club tournament. And lastly, winning the Pandey section was Rishaan Negi, who is one of the club's youngest members. So, next year, the Winner's Keepers event will be the Bauer-Shah-R.Negi Chess Tournament.

For two weeks in April, FM Richard Bauer, one of the club's most senior and experienced and knowledgeable chess instructors, reviewed games from the recent Candidates Tournament, an elite event to determine who will challenge World Chess Champion Gukesh Dommaraju later this year for the prestigious title. Rick's focus during his lecture was on the games of Javokhir Sindarov, who is one of the youngest players ever to play in this tournament. Thanks to Rick for his in-depth analysis and commentary and for his constant contributions to the club. He is truly an asset to our organization.

A milestone occurred at the club at the last meeting in April when we welcomed our one-hundredth member. There are still four months remaining in the club's fiscal year, so we might get close to reaching the 119 membership mark, which was the record set back in 1973 during the Bobby Fischer boom. The club continues to grow and reach new heights, most notably seeing a record surge in scholastic membership, which comprises close to half of our membership.
